CWI honors 1,170 graduates

2015 marks CWI's sixth commencement ceremony

BOISE - Kassie Gomer hopes use her new degree to inspire children to read, just as one Boise public librarian inspired her when she was a girl.

Gomer, 39, of Boise, graduated from College of Western Idaho on Saturday, saying she decided to return to school now that she is "almost an empty-nester."

She was one of 1,170 graduates who celebrated in CWI's sixth commencement at the Taco Bell Arena in Boise.

After earning her associate degree in English, Gomer plans to attend Boise State University to study English literature for her bachelor's degree. She also plans to later finish a master's degree and become a librarian.

She still remembers her childhood librarian, who always wore purple and had purple hair.

She made me love books and introduced me to 'Anne of Green Gables' and Jane Austen and it was wonderful," Gomer said.

CWI boasts the average GPA among students at the school is 3.21, 328 of its grads left the school with honors and 199 of the grads had multiple degrees or certificates. CWI's youngest graduate in 2015 was 17 and

Chris Luleff, 38, of Nampa, graduated with a degree as a computer support specialist. He hopes to use his education to eventually start his own business and develop his career.

After introductions, CWI President Bert Glandon spoke to the graduates on the importance the goals set to use the education
