POWERING THE TREASURE VALLEY CAMPAIGN

CWI is on the brink of a historic milestone with its Powering the Treasure Valley comprehensive campaign — an ambitious \$138 million initiative to expand educational opportunities and strengthen workforce development across Idaho. With 89% of the campaign goal already secured, CWI is now calling on individuals and organizations in the community to help shape the future of education in the Treasure Valley.

At the heart of this campaign is a commitment to student success. From the three new buildings on our Nampa Campus, currently under construction, to the planned Boise campus expansion, these investments will directly impact our students' educational experience and address regional workforce needs. The campaign also supports expanding student scholarships and enhancing academic programs.





The generosity of early campaign leaders has been instrumental in our progress thus far. The J.R. Simplot Company, CapEd Credit Union, the Laura Moore Cunningham Foundation, and Delta Dental have stepped forward as champions of education, demonstrating their support for Idaho's students and economic future.

"You get a lot of bang for your buck at community college," says Mike Laird, who established the Robert Laird Scholarship in 2022 to honor his father's belief in the impact of education.

Laird's father was a businessman who knew hard work and dedication could change lives. He believed in giving people the tools to build something of their own — just as he had done.

That legacy inspired Laird and his family to start a foundation focused on expanding opportunities for students who might not have access to other resources.

For Laird, the impact of community college is personal. It was at a community college that he discovered his path, earning a chemistry degree that led him to a Master of Business Administration from University of California,

Irvine, and a successful career. Knowing firsthand how education opens doors, he wanted to help CWI students gain the same opportunities.

Introduced to CWI by Foundation Board Member, Estela Rosales, Laird saw the College as a great fit for his family's mission. "Ever since I moved here in 2007, I've heard great things about CWI and knew what a big need it fills in the community," he shares. "I'm excited to play a small part in helping students succeed — whether that is continuing their education or launching a career."

For those considering starting a scholarship, Laird offers this advice: "Think about the impact you can have. You can help open the eyes of students to new opportunities for them to succeed."

ENTREPRENEUR LAB

The CWI Entrepreneur Lab launched this past fall with seed funding from generous donors for the program.

The Entrepreneur Lab is dedicated to empowering the entrepreneurial spirit at CWI. From inception, a side-hustle, or next-level business planning, the Entrepreneur Lab was created to support the efforts of our students starting their own businesses.

In November, Meagan Ruped and Seth Hoover became the first winners of the Entrepreneur Lab Competition, with a business plan modeled on their own experiences.

In 2023, Ruped was diagnosed with breast cancer. "We came up with the idea for the Powerport Sweater as a potential solution to some of the struggles she faced while undergoing treatment," said Hoover.

To develop their business plan, they partnered closely with the Entrepreneur Lab staff and used Hoover's education in the Business program. They plan to use their prize winnings from the competition to keep moving their business forward.

"If we can make just one patient feel less like a patient, that will be a success for us," Hoover said.




The Wishing Well Fund supports a wide variety of departments who are trying to innovate and enhance student learning opportunities.
